→ Overview

Financing Surveillance and Pandemics Preparedness and Response (PPR) is a six-month learning grant that aims to generate rich insights on 'what works, where it works, and how and why it works.' This informs the design and implementation of a longer-term project and increase country commitment to sustainable financing of surveillance and PPR.

Inadequate investments in health by African countries remains the biggest challenge underpinning the weak health systems on the continent. This problem is compounded by persisting inefficiencies and wastages in the utilisation of the limited budgets for health. The acknowledgement of this problem has seen African leaders make commitments on increasing investments in health over the years, including the 2001 Abuja Declaration, and more recently, the 2019 African Leadership Meeting (ALM) Declaration. The ALM Declaration, ratified by 52 Heads of State of the African Union (AU), has generated notable traction and momentum among member states.

The ALM Declaration comprises 10 commitments that can be clustered into four main areas, namely:

- Increasing domestic investments in health.
- Addressing wastages and inefficiencies in health budget allocation and expenditure.
- Tackling equity issues to ensure health financing enables access to quality healthcare for all.
- Strengthening leadership and governance of health financing.

What we are doing

To disseminate the knowledge and information gained from the project, we are undertaking the following:

- At country-level in Kenya and Zambia: Presenting and discussing information generated by the project with relevant Ministry of Health (MoH) officials to generate support for, and inform their decisions and actions on, financing surveillance and PPR.
- At regional level at the East African Community (EAC) and Southern African Development Community (SADC): Sharing the information generated by the project, as well as providing opportunities for Kenya and Zambia to share their progress and lessons on domestic financing of surveillance and PPR with other countries in the two regions.

The African Institute for Development Policy (AFIDEP) leads and oversees the implementation of the project in partnership with Globesolute. AFIDEP focuses on evidence generation, technical assistance, and ministry-level dialogues. Meanwhile, Globesolute handles high-level health financing diplomacy with the presidency and cabinets, as well as regional-level engagements. Both teams are collaborating on all project activities. The project is funded by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation.
